Education & Senior's Housing Property Tax

In addition to levying property taxes sufficient to meet the annual operating and capital budget requirements of the County, the County is also required to levy and collect school and senior's housing foundation taxes. Every year the province calculates, based on assessment value, the amount each municipality must contribute towards the public education system.

Municipalities collect the education property tax from ratepayers and then forward it to the province for deposit into the Alberta School Foundation Fund (ASFF).

What does this tax pay for? The education property tax supports all public and separate school students. The education property tax helps pay for instructional costs including teacher salaries, textbooks, and other classroom resources.

Does everyone pay the education property tax? All property owners pay the education property tax (with some exceptions, such as non-profit organizations and senior's lodge facilities.) People without children in school also pay the education property tax.

Can I direct my education property tax to a private school? No. Provincial law, money collected through the education property tax can only be used to fund the public education system, which includes public and separate schools. Private school funding comes from 3 sources: provincial general revenues, tuition, or instruction fees paid by parents, and private fundraising.



How is my share calculated? Your share is based on the assessment value of your property and the local education property tax.

Where does the education property tax go? The money collected from the education property tax goes to fund Albertans' priorities in education. The education property tax is pooled into the ASFF and then distributes among Alberta's public and separate school boards on an equal per-student basis.

All Separate schools in the province have opted-out of the ASFF, which means they requisition and collect property tax money from the municipalities directly. Any difference between what an opted-out board collects and what they are entitled to receive is adjusted so there is no financial gain to a school jurisdiction that opts out of the ASFF.



Clear Hills County Property Tax notices will be sent out the begin in May 2023!

Deadline to appeal and pay your 2023 taxes is **July 17, 2023**.

When a mill rate increases, this does not necessarily mean the property tax amount will increase in direct proportion, or vice versa.

If a property's assessment value has not increased, the mill rate is adjusted in such a way to lessen the impact of the property tax value.

The assessed value is a separate calculation based upon many factors that will determine what the final tax levy will be.

The assessed value is rarely the same as an appraised or market value.

What are Mill Rates?

The mill rate is the amount of tax payable per dollar of the assessed value of a property. Mill stands for millage and is based on the Latin word for 'thousandth'. One mill is equal to 1/1000th. The mill rate is synonymous with local tax rates in Alberta. The mill rate changes from year to year in relation to local property valuations (assessments). Assessments are based upon previous sales within Clear Hills County.

Clear Hills County has 4 classifications of assessed property; Residential, Non-Residential, Farmland and Machinery & Equipment. Each classification is assigned its own mill (tax) rate and this method is used to determine the taxes that are to be paid on that property. Properties classified as Non-Residential and Machinery & Equipment are assigned the same mill rate, as required by legislation.

Assessment Value x Mill Rate ÷ 1,000 = TAX LEVY

For example:

In 2021 a residential property is assessed at \$100,000.00. In 2022 the property is taxed at a total residential mill rate of 4.4201. Therefore, the total tax payable will be \$442.01.

 $100,000.00 \times 4.4201 \div 1,000 = 442.01$

Assessment

Farm Properties- Farmland is defined as "land used for farming operations as defined in the regulations", and is assessed based on its productivity level based on regulated rates developed by Alberta Municipal Affairs.

Farm Buildings– Defined as "any improvement other than a residence, to the extent it is used for farming operations".

How is farmland valued for assessment? Farmland is assessed based in its agricultural use value. All farmland is rated on the basis of its ability to produce income from the growing of crops and/or the raising of livestock. The productive value of farmland is determined using a process that sets a value for the best soils, and then makes adjustments for less than optimal conditions such as rocks, sloughs, or topography not conductive to farming practices.

What is Rural Assessment Policy (RAP)?

The Rural Assessment Policy (RAP) is applied towards a residence on farmland. Based on the assessment value of the farmland, a residence located on that farmland is partially exempted from assessment. The land and/or residence must be privately owned by the same owner leased from the province or municipality. Land that is leased by private landowners does not qualify for an exemption. The maximum exemption that a residence can receive on its assessment is \$61,540. Any additional residences on the farmland may receive an exemption of up to \$30,770.

Example: A farmer has a house with an assessment of \$200,000 and 6 quarters of land with a total assessment of \$120,000. The farmer would qualify to receive the maximum RAP exemption towards his residence assessment.

\$200,000—\$61,540= \$138,460 taxable assessment on the residence.

*The RAP exemption amount will appear on your tax assessment notice for the purpose of providing a total assessment value of the property. It is not included in the taxable assessment total of the property, as it is a tax exempt value.

Do you need a Development Permit?

Development Permits are required in Clear Hills County pursuant to the Clear Hills County Land Use Bylaw. A Development Permit ensures that the proposed use of the land does not conflict with surrounding uses and that the proposed development is set back the appropriate distances from the property lines and roadways, located in a safe location (not too close to water bodies or oil and gas facilities etc.)

When you are planning to construct a new building, structurally renovate an existing building, or change the use of your property, you will need a development permit.

The Clear Hills County Land Use Bylaw also details development NOT requiring a permit. A few common ones are:

- Any farm use building, shed, dugout (located at least 40.8m/134 feet from the road right-ofway) or minor accessory use that otherwise conforms with the provisions of the Land Use Bylaw.
- Minor repair or maintenance to a building (provided there are no structural changes).
- The erection or repair of a fence that is less than 1 meter (3 feet) in height in front yards and 2 meters (6 feet) in height in rear and side yards.
- Decks (provided they have no walls or roof and are less than .6 meter (2 feet) from the ground level.
- Accessory buildings (sheds etc.) under 9.29m² that do not have a foundation.

Did you know!

In accordance with the Municipal Government Act every municipality must pass a land use bylaw.

The purpose of the bylaw is to outline the rules and regulations for development of land within the Municipality.

Clear Hills County Council is reviewing our current Land Use Bylaw to make it easier to read and find information, in addition also cleaning up duplicate items or items that are not relevant to our county. This review is being completed without changing the original content and information.

If you are planning to construct a building, start a business, change land use (zone), undertake renovations or redevelopment, erect a sign, or establish a secondary suite, the Land Use Bylaw will provide direction on the applicable rules and regulations you'll need to consider.

Fire Permits are required for all burning outside of the Non-Permit area (with the exclusion of campfires) from April 1st to October 31st each year.





Brush piles & windrows Safe burning practices

Brush piles & windrows

Brush piles and windrows are commonly used to burn woody debris from land clearing for agricultural and development purposes. Alberta Wildfire can advise you on how to construct your burn site so it meets the guidelines for safe burning practices required for your fire permit.

Getting a permit

A fire permit explains safe burning practices that will help prevent your fire from becoming a wildfire. It is required for all fires, except campfires, in the Forest Protection Area of Alberta. Fire permits are free and can be requested from Alberta. Wildfire. To locate your nearest office go to **firepermits.alberta.ca** or call 310-0000. Fire permits are required from March 1 to October 31.


Permit cancellations

Fire permits may be suspended or cancelled if the fire hazard in the area changes. In these situations, the permit holder will be notified and must immediately extinguish all fires. In the event of a fire ban or restriction, all fire permits can be suspended.

Fall and winter burning

Fire permits allow staff to know where burning is approved so firefighters and aircraft are free to fight wildfires. They are not required in winter, however following safe burning practices during this period will help prevent holdover fires that can start spring wildfires. Although the snow helps reduce the risk of the fire burning into the ground,we recommend that you check all fall and winter burn sites to ensure that the fire is out. Walk the burn area and roll over any debris to check for hot spots.

Minimum spacing for windrows



Prepare the site

- Brush piles and windrows must be at least 25 metres from trees and bushes.
- A fireguard 15 metres wide and cleared down to the mineral soil must completely surround the area.
 - Windrows cannot be more than 60 metres in length with a minimum eight metre break between each windrow.
- Windrows and brush piles cannot be more than 6 metres wide
 Parallel windrows must be separated by at least 15 metres.
- To allow for a cleaner burn, ensure that you reduce the amount of soil and dirt in your windrows or brush piles. Clean burning reduces the likelihood of smoke issues and smouldering files. Smouldering fires can last for months and emerge as a wildfire in mome do woothoor

Safe burning practices

- Only burn what you can control and follow
- permit.
- Watch for sporks and burning material that may result in sn

- If the wind is gusting over 15 km/hour or increases beyond the limit on your permit, immediately extinguish your fire.



Know the signs of testicular cancer

Testicular cancer is rare but it is the most common cancer among young men.

Testicular cancer occurs when cells that aren't normal grow out of control in the testicles (testes). It is highly curable, especially when it is found early.

The most common symptoms of testicular cancer include:

- A lump or swelling in the scrotum that may or may not be painful.
- A heavy feeling in the scrotum.
- A dull pain or feeling of pressure in the lower belly or groin.

Experts don't know what causes testicular cancer. But some problems, such as having an undescended testicle or Klinefelter syndrome, may increase a man's risk for this cancer. Most men who get testicular cancer don't have any risk factors.

How is testicular cancer diagnosed?

If these tests show signs of cancer, you will have surgery to remove the testicle. Surgery is the ^r only way to know for sure if you have testicular cancer and what kind of cancer it is. This information also helps in planning any other treatment you may need.

How is it treated?

For some people, surgery to remove the testicle may be all the treatment they need. The type and stage of your cancer will help your doctor know if you need more treatment.

Treatment after surgery may include surveillance, chemotherapy, or radiation therapy. Chemotherapy is often used for cancer that has spread to other parts of the body. In some cases, surgery is used to remove that kind of cancer.

How will having testicular cancer affect you?

In most cases, removing a testicle doesn't cause long-term sexual problems or make you unable to father children. But if you had these problems before treatment, surgery may make them worse. And other treatments for cancer may cause you to become infertile. You may want to think about saving sperm in a sperm bank. Talk to your doctor if you have any questions or concerns about sexual problems or whether you can father children.

Limit sugar for a sweet smile

April is Oral Health Month in Canada. Regular brushing and flossing are good habits to help reduce tooth decay. However, limiting added sugar is also an important way you can prevent tooth decay and protect overall health.

Choosing too many foods and drinks with added sugar can increase your risk for tooth decay. Acid is produced when the bacteria in your mouth eat sugar. The acid dissolves the tooth surface (enamel) and can lead to tooth decay. Added sugar also adds calories without any nutrients, and can contribute to other diseases such as diabetes, obesity and cardiovascular disease.

Added sugars are found in processed foods and drinks and can also be used to preserve foods such as jams and jellies. They can be added for taste, texture and colouring. Sugary drinks are the main source of added sugars in most people's diets. Examples include pop, fruit-flavored drinks, flavoured milks, sport drinks, and specialty coffees. Other foods high in added sugar are sweetened baked goods and desserts, chocolate and candy, and condiments like ketchup and jam.

The good news is that when we eat and drink less sugar, we lower the risk of tooth decay. Here are some tips to limit added sugar for healthy teeth and overall health:

At the grocery store:

• Read the ingredient list. Words ending in "ose" such as sucrose and fructose, or words such as syrups, honey, molasses, fruit juice and puree concentrate are sugars. When



they appear at the beginning of the list, the food is higher in sugar. Choose these foods less often.

When cooking and baking:

- Choose recipes with little or small amounts of added sugar.
- Try cutting down on the sugar, syrup, molasses and honey in your recipes. For example, instead of 1 cup (250 mL) use 1/2 or 3/4 cup (125 or 175 mL).
- Flavour foods with spices, herbs, lemon or vinegars, such as balsamic and cider, instead of bottled, premade sauces.
- Ready-made sauces such as sweet and sour, honey garlic, and ketchup contain sugar. Use them less often and in smaller amounts.

At home and when eating away from home:

- Drink water to quench your thirst.
- Limit the amount of sugar you add to foods and drinks during preparation or at the table.
- Limit the number of sugary drinks you have, such as pop, fruit-flavoured drinks, flavoured milks, sport drinks and specialty coffees.
- When choosing a snack, pick vegetables or fruit that do not contain added sugar.

Do you have livestock?

Are you aware of the VSI (Veterinarian Services Incorporated) Program?

- * Aids in the development of livestock expansion with a long term goal of the producer and veterinarian services sustainability.
- * The VSI program supplies a cost-share support to livestock producers, whereby Clear Hills County covers 50% of the cost eligible veterinary procedures.
- * Membership is \$52.50 for a five year term.

Do you know the County has a BSE Testing Incentive Program?

The BSE testing program is to encourage producers to participate in BST Testing and assist in realizing the target of 30,000 beef cattle annually being tested to keep Canada's status as a controlled BSE risk country.

Eligibility: must be a VSI member and resident/landowner in Clear Hills County with livestock.

Restrictions: Only Veterinarian Clinics (and livestock owners) will have access to the BSE test results.

Process: VSI services provides the County with a list of members that had beef cattle tested in the quarterly report. The County then pays the member. The 20022/2023 incentive is \$125/animal.

The North Peace Regional Landfill requests that you not place used twine from your hay and straw bales in the garbage bins at the County Transfer Stations or your own personal bins, as when the loads come into the Regional Landfill the twine can wrap around the drums of the Compactor causing operational issues.

Instead, place the loose twine (plastic only) in recycling bags that can be picked up from the Regional Landfill or the Transfer Station Attendants and return the full bags to the Collection site.

This twine can be recycled into car parts, flower pots, composite decking and dimensional lumber.


