Clubroot Information Session Eureka River Hall Hosted By ClearHills County Dec 19/24

Agricultural Fieldman Greg Coon started off the morning explaining a bit about the ClearHills Clubroot policy, which every attendee received a handout with the policy attached.

County weed inspectors check canola crops at the time of swathing; because its easier to walk in a canola crop than before its knocked down and you wont see gulls before then. It's a short window when the right time is because they start shrinking when the plant dies off and you wont see them if the plant is too young either.

The inspector found a plant that had small gulls and notified our Ag Fieldman.

He then sent out samples to the correct lab for testing . He also had U of A personal out have a second diagnoses so there is no room for error

After receiving a positive test for confirmation He then went ahead and issued a Pest Notice to the Landowner and written notice of landowners within 5 miles that clubroot was confirmed

Clubroot is packed on your land JUST by SOIL.

That's one of the first things that goes through farmers heads

How did it get there?... no one will ever know. It could be by custom equipment, people driving on your land, dust blowing in the wind, even wildlife walking across your field.

## What is it?

Very serious soil-born disease of Canola and any other Cole crop, which includes turnip, radish and cabbages

# What does it look like?

The root of infected plant looks club-like
The plant will be stunted, wilting and yellowing. May
have premature ripening which reduces yields and oil
content in the seed

## What causes it?

Clubroot is caused by a soil-born pathogen called *Plasmodiophora brassicae* 

## Where was it first found?

It was found in home gardens on cabbage plants in the mid 1970s

First detected in Canola in Sturgeon County northwest of Edmonton in 2003

## Where did it come from?

The original source is unknown but may have come from infected vegetables from other areas of Canada or the US where it was already established.

# Why is it a concern?

Canola, Mustard and Cole crops are highly susceptible Anywhere from 10-80% yield loss. Results are similar to sclerotinia stem rot infection

# How can it spread?

Infested soil can be spread by farm machinery, especially tillage equipment. Can also be moved by wind and soil erosion; as well as straw or hay can be contaminated with resting spores via dust and dirt clumps

# How long does it persist in the soil?

Resting spores can and are extremely long lived, up to 20 years according to Swedish research. Similar resistance is being seen in Alberta

# What is being done about it?

Spring of 2007 Clubroot was added to the *Alberta's Agricultural Pest Act*. That gives Municipal authority of the enforcement of control measures for declared pests in Alberta. Annual testing is done in the main production areas of Canola and Cole crops. There are many Clubroot resistant varieties of seed developed for Western Canada

# Jason Casselman- Canadian Canola Council Agronomy Specialist

Clubroot first found in Alberta in 2003

Alberta: 5,833 quarters as of 2023

Saskatchewan: 82 as of 2023

Manitoba: 35 as of 2019

In 2024, there were 307 more found in Alberta 71% of the province or 47 counties have clubroot It thrives in low PH soils anything under 7.2PH Over 1 million spores in a teaspoon of dirt

# Keep spore load low

- -Crop rotation (4-1)
- -Control weeds (stink weed is also in the canola family)

# Keep local

- -Last field to be seeded /last to be harvested
- -Avoid travelling through patch

# Grow resistant varieties of seed

- Over 80 different varieties
- Some are better than others

Spray equipment with 2% bleach solution after cleaning off clumps of dirt Spray Nine works well, spray on foot ware if walking in fields

Reduce tillage so as not spreading it through the field

Perennial Rye grass somehow triggers spores to germinate resting spores with no host so they die

3.5 million resting spores – in 4 years will drop down to minimal numbers but will never be 0 55 different pathotypes of P. brassica; should start with  $1^{\rm st}$  generation Clubroot resistant variety seed then work your way to  $2^{\rm nd}$  gen and so on. You will always find seed

Don't grow same seed every year, and maybe grow several varieties same year

Clubroot is not transferable by seed at all JUST SOIL, now if the seed had dirt on it that's different After flowering and early swathing is the perfect time to check plants for clubroot. Generally at the entrances of fields is where you will find it (they recommend you seed a grass area to clean off equipment again before entering the field)

Can spot spray out plants or pick and bag plants Remember it's important to try something new vs. do nothing to manage Clubroot Clubroot doesn't like cool dry soil Clubroot.ca

#### Introduction

The Agricultural Service Board (ASB) Program conducts field visits annually to ensure ASB Grant funding appropriately supports ASB Grant Program objectives. Information gathered from field visits also benefits other ASBs in the development and delivery of programs related to the ASB Grant and provides evidence to the Office of the Auditor General on the effective and efficient use of ASB Grant dollars to support programs related to the ASB Act, environmental extension and awareness and rat control.

Alberta Agriculture and Irrigation (AGI) visited 15 municipalities in 2024 under the field visit program. Five municipalities from the South, three from Central, two from Northwest, two from Northeast, and three from the Peace region received a field visit in 2024.

## **Executive Summary**

Kerrianne Koehler-Munro, Manager, Agriculture Service Boards and Gayah Sieusahai, Pest Regulatory Officer, met with the, Greg Coon, Agricultural Fieldman for the County of Clear Hills on June 26, 2024 to review programs and projects implemented under the various Acts the ASB is delegated to enforce.

The County of Clear Hills received funding under the Legislative and Resource Management Funding Streams of the ASB Grant.

Based upon our field visit findings and observations, Clear Hills County, were able to demonstrate that they had programs related to each of these funding streams indicating effective use of ASB Grant dollars to support activities related to the administration of legislative requirements under the *Agricultural Service Board Act* and enhanced environmental awareness.

#### FIELD VISIT AGENDA - FIELD OFFICE & TOUR SITES:

- Met with Greg Coon, the Agricultural Fieldman, David Janzen, the ASB Chair, Jason Ruecker, ASB Deputy Chair, Ron Jensen, ASB Board, Gary Candy, ASB Board, Julie Watchorn, ASB Board, Baldur Ruecker, ASB Board, and their colleagues. ASB Board Member, Julie Lemoine was absent.
- Attended scheduled ASB board meeting and provided an overview of the field visit purpose and process.
- Legislative and resource management documentation was discussed and reviewed with Greg Coon.
- Toured the county to see weed management sites for ditches, private land, and railroad. Thistle, toadflax and chamomile seem to be the most prominent.

• Visited a local producer, Chris Kamphuis, who the fieldmen, Greg Coon has been working with to highlight some of the innovative projects such as a filter pot system for dugout water for agriculture spraying (<u>Filter pot for dugout water Agricultural Spraying (youtube.com)</u>)

#### Observations

- There is a good working relationship with consistent communication and reporting between the ASB and Ag Fieldmen to provide input and direction on agricultural issues and concerns within the county.
- The fieldman, Greg Coon has established a strong, collaborative working relationship with the ASB, county staff and seasonal staff.
- The agricultural services are supported by written policies and by-law, provides a high level of coverage for the management of weeds.
- Agriculture bylaws and policies are reviewed on an annual basis and they contain an adopted and amended dates, which is ideal and a best practice.
- Program information and materials (e.g., equipment rental, shelter belt program, VSI program, roadside spraying and farm water testing etc.) to support legislative and resource management programs are available on the county's website/Facebook, the county office and Clear Hills County Annual Highlights and Monthly Newsletters.
- The Clear Hills County Emergency Coordination Centre Manual Section 12 for Livestock is clear, easy to read and has practical information including area contact lists for receiving sites and emergency transportation options.
- Partner with Peace Country Beef and Forage Association for the delivery of agricultural programming through seminars, workshops and information sessions, e.g., Forest Grazing School, EFP & Grant Funding.
- Collaborates with local producers on innovative agricultural projects and advancements.

### OTHER TOPICS

- 1. There is a CAP grant and EFP presentation being held Feb 24<sup>th</sup> at 1:30 at the Dave Shaw Complex.
- 2. The clubroot samples found in the County last fall were tested for what pathotype strain they were. Those results came back on Feb 4<sup>th</sup>. The tests found that this clubroot is the most common pathotype found across Alberta, which is good news, as this means all the most common resistant varieties of canola seed will be resistant to this pathotype. An article about this finding will be posted on the website, in the newsletter, and on the Facebook page.
- 3. We are planning another Clubroot information session in the spring before seeding.
- 4. Advertisements for 3 weed inspector positions and 3 mower operators have been put on our website, the newsletter, and Facebook page.
- 5. The application for the ASB grant went out to Alberta Agriculture on Jan. 29<sup>th</sup>. The expectation is that legislative stream funding will remain the same as the last agreement at \$166,247.00 per year for the next 5 years. The resource management stream funding is a merit-based grant. The ask was for \$97,292.00 per year for the next 5 years. What the County will receive will be based on how many other municipalities applied for resource funding and how strong Alberta Ag feels our application is.
- 6. The County went to tender for a new mower on Jan 31<sup>st</sup>. It will close March 24<sup>th,</sup> and they will be opened March 25th.
- 7. 5 ASB members and the fieldman attended the provincial ASB conference January 20-22 in Edmonton. There were 13 resolutions to come to the floor at the conference. The chair of the meeting was not very strong which made for a bit of an unorganized resolution session. There was an incident where a delegate from another municipality made an unprofessional and disparaging remark about another municipality, and there were no repercussions at the session itself. A complaint letter from the municipality involved has been sent to the ASB Provincial Committee.
- 8. The County has applied for a temporary diversion license to pump water from the creek by Ken Bergs into the Eureka River non potable truck fill reservoir. The plan is to pump from the dugout directly behind the reservoir first and if that doesn't fill the reservoir, then we will pump from the creek.

Re: 2025 ASB Conference

The County of Northern Lights ASB recently attended the 2025 ASB Provincial Conference in Edmonton and was represented by 4 board members and the Agricultural Fieldman. This conference is always much anticipated by our board members as it offers many valuable updates, keynote speakers, networking opportunities, tradeshow and most importantly, the chance to present resolutions.

Resolutions have a long history of bringing regional and provincial agricultural matters forward. After a democratic process of presenting the resolutions, they are often debated, amended and then put to the assembly for a vote. Those that are approved then go to the ASB Provincial Committee, who in turn send them out for responses, grade the responses and then advocate for the resolution's intent. I want to bring attention to some inappropriate conduct during the resolution session on January 22<sup>nd</sup>. The County of Northern Lights brought forward 2 resolutions; one (8-25) was presented on the January 21<sup>st</sup>, and the second (13-25) on January 22<sup>nd</sup>. We always welcome debate and potential small amendments during the presentation and understand that in true democratic fashion, the subsequent vote determines whether the resolution passes or fails. What we do not agree with is condescending and disrespectful remarks.

These actions were displayed by an ASB member from Vulcan County who provided opposition to 13-25 and seemed frustrated that the resolution process was taking too long, as indicated by his comments and theatrical behavior regarding resolution 3-25 the day before. The comments that were made did not attempt to debate ideas, but attacked the resolutions as a waste of time, burdensome and that certain municipalities were sponsoring too many resolutions. "It is only an issue for a municipality that sponsored over half the resolutions" was the comment, while it doesn't sound too terrible on paper, the leadup, sentiment and delivery was enough to draw audible gasps and muttering from the crowd. After the conclusion of the Resolution Session, we received numerous commiserations for the exaggerated reaction, as it went too far.

Our feeling is, if this type of behaviour is allowed to continue with no intervention from the board, the potential for mudslinging and chaos will be inevitable and credibility of this great organization will be compromised. I have been approached by many ASB's that were witness to this uncalled-for comment, who strongly agree that it was totally inappropriate and needs to be addressed. These types of comments stifle debate, lead to less participation and dissuade future resolutions in fear of humiliation and ridicule.

These types of sessions are critical to generating solutions and change, if you disagree with an idea then say why you are against it—it doesn't need to be turned into a personal indiscretion against another municipality that is sponsoring the idea. The main purpose of the conference is to debate the resolutions, and debate should follow the correct code of conduct.

Enclosed is your 2025 VSI requisition of \$54,000.

Total 2024 VSI administrative costs, including claims G.S.T. (\$15,641), were approximately \$51,431. Your jurisdiction accounted for 296 (6.4%) of the 4,623 claim lines processed, hence your share of gross administrative costs (total administrative cost minus claim related GST) was deemed to be \$2,292

Investment income was approximately \$11,737. Total cost of your claims, as per your fourth quarter report, sent to <a href="mailto:greg@clearhillscounty.ab.ca">greg@clearhillscounty.ab.ca</a> and <a href="mailto:ExtensionServices@clearhillscounty.ab.ca">ExtensionServices@clearhillscounty.ab.ca</a> was 44,432. This was 7.1% of total claims expenditures of \$625,653. Your share of the interest was deemed to be \$834

For 2025 the 2024 VSI fee schedule was realigned with the 2024 ABVMA fee schedule, and then increased with 2.5%. A 10% contingency was added. As a result, your 2025 requisition is equal to your 2024 claims plus an 15.2% increase plus your estimated net administrative costs for 2024. The total was rounded to the nearest \$500. (Net administrative costs = total administrative costs minus investment income rounded to the nearest \$100.)

Following is an estimate of your current VSI balance after adding 2024 administrative costs and investment income:

The amount in your contract was based on the actual cost of claims for Oct 1, 2023 to Sept 30, 2024 plus an estimate of net administrative costs for 2023. The amount of your requisition is based on the actual cost of claims for 2024 plus an estimate of your 2024 net administrative costs (rounded to the nearest \$100). This explains the difference between your requisition of \$54,000 and the \$59,500 in your contract.

This letter replaces the February 3, 2025 letter and corrects the error due to missing the December interest. Please feel free to contact me if you detect any errors or if you have any questions. Thank you for your continuing support of VSI.
