Celebrating Canada's 150th Anniversary

On July 1, 1867, the British North Americas Act created the Dominion of Canada as a federation of four provinces. This event is known as the confederation of Canada. The four original provinces were created from the former British colonies of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the Province of Canada, which was divided into the provinces of Quebec and Ontario. Canada's boundaries have been extended since 1867, the country now consists of 10 provinces and 3 territories.

On June 10, 1868, the Canada's Governor General proclaimed Canadians should celebrate the anniversary of the confederation. July 1 became a statutory holiday, known as Dominion Day, in 1879. However, no official celebrations were held until the 50th anniversary in 1917 and the 60th anniversary in 1927. After World War II, Dominion Day was celebrated more frequently and more events were organized by the national government. After the centenary of confederation in 1967, Dominion Day events became more widespread. July 1 became popularly known as Canada Day. The date was officially known as Canada Day from 1983 onwards.

If you are burning where a permit is not required contact the County office at 780-685-3925 with details to prevent unnecessary response from the fire department.

The Alberta government is committed to protecting Albertans and their communities from the threat of a wildfire. Far too many wildfires are caused by human-activity and are 100% preventable. Approximately 70% of wildfires over the last six years have resulted in human activity. In fall of last year, legislation was

passed to enhance wildfire prevention, to deter risky behavior and give wildland fire fighters more tools to keep Albertans and their communities safe.

These regulation changes help support the legislation by including:

- * New penalties for violations such as abandoning campfires or burning during fire

bans

- * And improving government's ability to restrict higher risk activities, like fireworks and incendiary targets.

Penalties will be determined by a statutory decision-maker on a case-by-case basis.

Meet the Weed Inspectors

Alberta is extremely susceptible to invasive species. Some species are looking to get a good hold in our waterways and others are looking to invade our productive Agriculture land. For this reason the Weed Act proclaimed in 1907 and has existed in some form for more than 100 years, making it Alberta's oldest piece of legislation. Its latest version,

(proclaimed in June 2010) listed 46 Prohibited Noxious and 29 Noxious weeds requiring either eradication in the case of Prohibited Noxious or the control in the case of Noxious. The revision showed an increased focus on new invasive plants, that most had assumed weren't even in Alberta yet. To assist landowners/occupants to identify and de-

velop control of these legislated weeds, Clear Hills County appoints weed inspectors annually. One of their main goals is to create awareness about these new invasive weeds and why they must be controlled or eradicated.



Weed Report vs. Weed Notice

Should a Weed Inspector discover a noxious weed, they will write up a Weed Report and inform the landowner of the weed infestation. This is not a weed notice. A Weed Report is offered as an informational tool to encourage landowners to control the weeds in question/or contact their local Agricultural Services Department to earn more about plant management.

A Weed Notice, on the other

hand, is a legal document under the Alberta Weed Control Act. A Notice will be issued if a landowner has repeatedly failed to control the weeds identified on the Weed Report. A Weed Notice is a document that, if not complied with, will lead Clear Hills County taking control/eradicating the weeds in question with the landowner still responsible for the cost of the control.

Under the Act, Weed Inspectors, "may enter at any reasonable hour on land premises, and inspect the land or premises or any crops, hay, etc., excluding dwellings on the premises."

Do I Need a Development Permit?

Development permits are required in Clear Hills County pursuant to the Clear Hills County Land Use Bylaw. A development permit ensures that the proposed use of the land does not conflict with surrounds uses and that the proposed development is set back the appropriate distances from the property lines and the roadways, located in a safe location (not too close to water bodies or oil and gas facilities).

When you are planning to construct a new building, structurally renovate an existing building, or change the use (or intensity of use) of your property, you will need a development permit.

Contact the County's Development officer should you require assistance in completing a development permit application.

All Development located within 0.8km of a provincial highway requires a Roadside Development Permit from Alberta Transportation. For more information contact 780-427-2731

Development Permit Application

Development permit application forms are available at the County office or on the County website (www.clearhillscounty.ab.ca). There is no charge for agricultural, residential, and commercial development permit applications. There is a development penalty that should you develop without an approved development permit. Industrial applications are \$100 for every \$100,000 of development.

For more development, the following information is required but not limited to:

- * Property owners signature
- * Development type, start date, completion date and construction costs
- * Site Plan
- * Floor Plan
- * Signed right of entry form

Additional information may be required by the Development Officer

The Development Officer will be pleased to explain the Land Use Bylaw regulations and how they apply to you.

The Clear Hills County Land Use Bylaw also details development NOT requiring a permit. A few common ones are:

- ⇒ Any farm use building, shed, dugout (located at least 40.8m/134 feet from the road right-of-way) or minor accessory use must otherwise conform to the provisions of the Land Use Bylaw.
- ⇒ Minor repair or maintenance to a building (providing there are no structural changes).
- ⇒ The erection or repair of a fence that is less than 1 meter (3 feet) in height in front yards and 2 meters (6 feet) in height in rear and side yards.
- ⇒ Decks (provided they have no walls or roof and are less then .6 metres (2 feet) from ground level
- ⇒ Accessory buildings (shed etc.) under 9.29m² (100m²) that does not have a foundation.

Additional Permits

In addition to a development permit, you may also require:

- ⇒ Building Permit
- ⇒ Gas Permit
- ⇒ Electrical Permit
- ⇒ Plumbing Permit
- ⇒ Private Sewage Treatment System permit

- Scientists with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada will be presenting preliminary results of a research project assessing the potential impact of future climate change on land suitability for crop production in the Peace River Region.
- The Land Suitability Rating System (LSRS) uses soil, landscape and climate data to evaluate the suitability of land for the production of a variety of agricultural crops.
- The LSRS is similar to, but replaces, the earlier Canada Land Inventory (CLI) approach to rating land capability for agriculture.
- LSRS has generally been used with current climate datasets, but more recently has been used with future climate data predicted using a variety of Global Change Models.
- What possible impacts will climate change have on the land suitability for crop production over the next 15, 45 or 75 years?

Tansy Ragwort

Jacobaea vulgaris (Aka Stinking Willie, Staggerwort, Tansy Butterweed)

Provincial Designation:
Prohibited Noxious

Overview:

Tansy Ragwort is a biennial or perennial in the sunflower family. Although normally short-lived, plants may remain in the rosette stage for several years if damaged or subjected to intense competition.¹ Tansy Ragwort is native to Europe, Asia and Siberia and is thought to have been introduced to Canada in the 1850s in ship's ballast² and as a medicinal herb. It has since spread mostly as an impurity in hay.³

Tansy Ragwort is an aggressive plant that quickly establishes on disturbed sites.⁴ In Prince Edward Island, it has reduced pasture yields by 50%.² The weed also invades woodlands, decreasing biodiversity. Evidence suggests that it can release toxins into the soil, harming nearby plants.³ Alkaloids within the plant also make it toxic to livestock, causing irreversible liver damage. Cattle and horses typically do not graze it but can be poisoned by contaminated hay or silage.⁴

Habitat:

Tansy Ragwort prefers sites with full sun to partial shade and well-drained, medium to light soils.³ The plant is generally absent in areas with a high water table.² In Eastern Canada it is most commonly found in pastures, hay fields, waste places, roadsides and forest edges.²

Identification:

Stems: One-several erect stems are 0.2-1.2 m in height.⁵ Stems are often purplish and many-branched near the tips.³

Leaves: Rosette leaves are stalked, dark-green, 7-20 cm long with deeply indented and blunt toothed lobes giving them a ruffled or ragged appearance. Upper leaves are similar in shape but much smaller in size and stalkless. Both types of leaves are somewhat hairy on the underside.⁴

Flowers: Heads of usually 13 yellow ray and numerous yellow disc flowers are located in flat-topped clusters.² The bracts surrounding each head are black-tipped and in a single row.⁵

Seeds: Two forms of ribbed fruits (achenes)

are produced. Those from disc flowers are hairy while the ones produced by rays are smooth.⁶ Both forms are rectangular, with a white cluster of hairs (pappus) at the top and approximately 3 mm in length.⁵

Prevention:

The best way to avoid Tansy Ragwort is to monitor pastures for new populations.⁵ If detected; plants should be hand-pulled taking care to remove the root. Remnants of root left behind will re-sprout to form new plants.⁴ Plants already in flower must be carefully bagged and burned.³ Forage seed can be a source of new infestations. Buying certified seed will reduce spread since Tansy Ragwort is listed as a prohibited noxious weed in the Canada Seeds Act.⁷

Control:

Cultural: Densely seeded pastures deter Tansy Ragwort because its seedlings are poor competitors.² Covering bare sites with mulch will also help to prevent germination of the weed.⁴

Grazing: Sheep are able to consume Tansy Ragwort without any ill effects and have been used extensively in New Zealand for control.⁶

Mechanical: Mowing is not recommended. It will prevent seed production but it will also cause plants to develop multiple crowns and a perennial habit.⁶


Chemical: 2,4-D, Aminopyralid (alone or in a product combination with 2,4-D), Dicamba, Hexazinone, MCPA, and Mecoprop (in a product combination with 2,4-D & Dicamba) are registered for use on tansy ragwort. Always check product labels to ensure the herbicide is registered for use on the target plant in Canada by the Pest Management Regulatory Agency. Always read and follow label directions. Consult your local Agricultural Fieldman or Certified Pesticide Dispenser for more information.

Biological: The host-range testing of a cold hardy Swiss strain of *Longitarsus jacobaeae*, a root-feeding beetle has been completed. A different strain of this agent is already well-established on the lower mainland in BC but has yet to survive a transfer to the more variable seasons experienced in the interior. A petition for importation into Canada was approved in 2011. A field release was made in the Okanagan in May 2011⁸.


