1. Policy Statement:

1.1. Clear Hills County recognizes the value of utilizing tax dollars to provide equipment available for rent to County residents, land managers and agricultural producers.

2. Purpose:

- 2.1. To supply equipment for rent that would not be economically feasible for individual agricultural producers or land managers to purchase and is not readily available for rent through other rental agents.
- 2.2. To provide innovative tools and equipment for local agricultural producers and land managers that promotes innovative agricultural management practices.
- 2.3. To provide tools and equipment that assist agricultural producers and land managers to comply with their legislative requirements under Alberta's Weed Control Act, Soil Conservation Act and Agricultural Pests Act.

3. Responsibilities

- 3.1. The Agricultural Service Board will recommend to Council a list of rental equipment and a schedule of fees for equipment deposits and rental rates.
- 3.2. The Agricultural Service Board may recommend to Council to purchase, replace, or liquidate rental equipment based on the three purposes in section 2.
- 3.3. Agricultural Services will provide the Agricultural Service Board with a list of rental rates and deposits based on the following structure:
 - 3.3.1. Equipment purchased to fulfil subsection 2.1 will have a rental rate to recover capital costs and maintenance costs of that equipment;
 - 3.3.2. Equipment purchased to fulfil subsection 2.2 will have a rental rate to recover maintenance costs only;
 - 3.3.3. Equipment purchased to fulfil subsection 2.3 will have a minimal rental rate to maximize the equipment use;
 - 3.3.4. Deposits greater than the designated minimum amount will be double

the rental rate of that equipment.

- 3.4. County staff will have knowledge of each piece of equipment and will inform the renter of proper operating procedures and safety precautions.
- 3.5. Agriculture Services will conduct pre- and post-rental inspections of all equipment to ensure equipment is in good condition, will operate properly and is safe to use.
- 3.6. Renters will sign a rental agreement form and assume responsibility for all costs associated with equipment returned damaged or not properly cleaned.
- 3.7. County staff will refuse to rent out equipment that is unfit and/or unsafe for use.
- 3.8. Agricultural Services will provide an annual report to the Agricultural Service Board for a program review in February of each year.



SUBJECT: Restriction of Genetically Engineered Alfalfa

The Council for the County of Northern Lights, together with our surrounding municipal neighbors within the Peace Region of Northwest Alberta, have been trying to keep our area free of Genetically Engineered Alfalfa for the past 2 years. Up to this time, we have not received the support of our provincial government, and we are writing your department to request your support and consideration of our concerns.

The Peace Region of Alberta – the Peace Block includes the north east portion of BC and is a large forage product producer. Because of its geographical isolation, this area has the potential to prevent the establishment of GE Alfalfa. The Municipal District of Smoky River in northwestern Alberta, produced the first bylaw against GE Alfalfa, with many other municipalities following suit, as well as BC Peace Districts. We believe that with this Peace Region Block we can prevent the establishment of GE Alfalfa and secure a regional niche forage industry; however, the Department of Alberta Agriculture and Forestry has denied the request to designate GE Alfalfa as Prohibited Noxious and they have stated that the Weed Control Act is "not meant to regulate commerce or the marketplace".

The Canadian Forage and Hay Industries have built their foreign trade reputation on variety purity. There are many countries that our seed and hay are exported to that do not accept GE products. In other countries, only a very low percentage of GE will be tolerated. When our contracted shipments reach the country of destination, they do sample testing of the containers. If GE contaminates are found, the shipment is refused and sent back to Canada. The grower must then pay the shipping of their product both ways and loses a sale.

The Alberta Forage Industry is worth 1.6 billion dollars (foreign and domestic combined according to Stats Canada). This is the concern – once GE alfalfa is released for sale into our area, zero tolerant or low tolerant importing countries will enhance their scrutiny for GE contaminants. All forage and hay shipments from our region, not just alfalfa, will be closely monitored.

To assist us in protecting our producers, we are requesting that the Honorable Minister, do a full cost benefit analysis prior to opening up new markets or approving products such as GE Alfalfa.

We have enclosed for your information, a copy of a resolution which was passed at our 2016 Spring Convention of the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties (now Rural Municipalities of Alberta), and ask for your support in ensuring that Alberta's export markets continue-to-be successful in those countries not accepting GE alfalfa products, including China, Japan, the European Union and the Middle East.

Thank you in advance for your support, and we look forward to hearing from you in this regard.

WHEREAS alfalfa is one of the largest crops in Canada in area with Alberta's output comprising approximately 30% of the country's total alfalfa hay and seed production; and

WHEREAS many of Alberta's forage seed producers sell products into countries that forbid the import of genetically modified (GM)/engineered alfalfa products; and

WHEREAS planting genetically modified/engineered alfalfa will pose a serious threat to the province's forage seed exports which included fourteen million kilograms of exported alfalfa seed (estimated at \$75 million) in 2014 as well as export hay, feed supplements and alfalfa sprouts for human consumption; and

WHEREAS alfalfa is the first perennial genetically modified/engineered crop that is pollinated by wild and tame insects; and

WHEREAS genetically modified/engineered alfalfa has the ability to cross-pollinate with non-GM alfalfa and there is a high risk of cross contamination due to seed escape and cross pollination which, once it occurs, will be impossible to contain; and

WHEREAS feral/wild alfalfa is rampant along ditches, fence lines, field edges, and uncultivated areas throughout Alberta and pollen and gene flow is unavoidable; and

WHEREAS alfalfa is a primary feed source for much of Alberta's organic animal agricultural production and as such contaminated feed and seed sources will jeopardize the organic status of the industry as well as threaten the booming organic export industry; and

WHEREAS neither the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) nor Health Canada has done a complete due diligence assessment prior to the approval of genetically modified/engineered alfalfa for release into Canada, having never done a quantified government economic impact assessment on the effects of genetically modified/engineered alfalfa on Canadian export markets;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties request that Alberta Agriculture and Forestry and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency work with Alberta's agricultural service boards, marketing groups, Forage Genetics Canada and other relevant stakeholders to prevent the introduction of genetically modified/engineered alfalfa to the province of Alberta until there is a marketplace and consumer acceptance in Alberta's export markets including China, Japan, the European Union, and the Middle East.

Member Background

Alfalfa is the single most predominant legume grown for forage in Canada (Canadian Forage and Grassland Association, October, 2012). Alberta is a valuable producer of Canada's alfalfa crop, comprising over 30% of the country's total alfalfa output. By area, it is the third largest crop in Canada with over 25 million acres in production and more than 80% of that production is located in the Prairie Provinces (Canadian Biotechnology Action Network, November, 2015). At 15 million pounds in 2012, alfalfa seed exportation ranked third in Canadian exports.

Roundup Ready alfalfa is a genetically modified (GM) crop. Although several GM crops have already been introduced into Canada, alfalfa would be the first significant perennial plant to be genetically engineered and introduced into the Western Canadian environment that is naturally cross-pollinated by insects and grows wild throughout the world. The economic benefits of GM alfalfa crops are unclear at this time – they

have not produced higher yields, herbicide costs have risen and exported alfalfa products have been rejected due to contamination.

As some countries have strict importation laws forbidding GM products, the presence of GM alfalfa in Canadian hay exports could potentially put an end to export markets for Canadian grass and forage seed growers. In 2014, China was Canada's second largest importer of alfalfa seed and China presently has zero tolerance for GM alfalfa products. China blacklisted three American hay exporters in 2014 and rejected hundreds of container loads of hay due to the detection of Roundup Ready alfalfa (The Western Producer, November, 2014). As hay is partially comprised of alfalfa, U.S. hay prices have dropped by about 12% due in part to the actions of China.

Mountain Sunrise Feed Co., a small hay exporter in the U.S., had been shipping about half its product (1,000 tons per month) to China but has now stopped because of the rejection of several of its cargoes. The owner has been forced to lay off employees and is only using 50% of its production capacity due in part to reduced exports. Anderson Hay & Grain, one of the largest U.S. hay exporters, stated that "it's had a huge impact on our business" (The Wall Street Journal, December, 2014).

Heather Kerschbaumer, president of Forage Seed Canada, personally experienced a \$20,000 loss three years ago when Japan detected a canola seed in a shipment of timothy seed from her farm and subsequently cancelled their contract. She is concerned about Roundup Ready alfalfa contaminating her alfalfa seed product, which would result in an additional loss of those markets. "We find alfalfa in 60 to 70 percent of the lots shipped out of the Peace [Region]. If it is genetically modified, we would lose all those markets as well."

Kerschbaumer recently visited the Imperial Valley in California, where the three blacklisted hay producers are located: "They told us if you can't keep it out of Canada, keep it out of the West. If you can't keep it out of Alberta. If you can't keep it out of Alberta, you should keep it out of the Peace because there will be benefits and bonuses paid on the seed that is produced that is GE free" (The Western Producer, November, 2014).

Canada's flax industry has been devastated due to contamination of GM material. In 2009, even though the GM variety of flax (CDC Triffid) had been de-registered by the University of Saskatchewan, about 3.5% of the farmer and elevator flax samples tested positive and contamination was found in exports to 35 countries that had not approved GM flax. As a result Canada's European market, which makes up 60% of its flax market, was closed. Canada's flax production declined significantly from 930,000 tonnes in 2009 to 518,200 tonnes in 2012. The source of GM contamination was never identified.

As illustrated, it is highly probable that GM alfalfa contamination will occur if it is introduced into Alberta. Non-GM alfalfa can be contaminated by GM alfalfa through seed escape, pollinator-mediation, and feral/volunteer alfalfa. More specifically, contamination can occur in purchased seed, seed spillage during planting, harvest and transport, insufficient cleaning of equipment, hay transport, animal vectors, dormant seed, and volunteer alfalfa growth.

Alfalfa is pollinated primarily by leafcutter bees but also by honeybees, wild bees and other native pollinators that are capable of traveling great distances and have unpredictable ranges. Cross-pollination occurs in nature when pollinating insects inadvertently transfer pollen from one plant to another while gathering nectar. Since perennial plants such as alfalfa are capable of flowering multiple times per year, the risk of genetic contamination by cross-pollination is significantly higher than annual crops.

In addition, Alberta's variable climate and annual precipitation (Alberta Water Portal) limit the 'best management practices' for production of GM alfalfa that indicate cutting hay prior to 10% bloom in order to contain gene flow and reduce contamination. Fields that are in hay production one year and then seed

production the next, or vice-versa, often due to the weather patterns, may also add to the problem of contamination.

New genetically modified varieties of alfalfa currently being marketed in the U.S., such as HarvXtra, a lowlignin/Roundup Ready, "stacked trait" alfalfa is being marketed as a great improvement over existing varieties, since the low-lignin trait allows hay to be cut later in the season (at least 50% bloom) without loss of feed quality, thus reducing the effects of weather on timely management and encouraging growers of mixed hay or alfalfa hay fields to take advantage of more tonnage per cut of hay. However, as noted earlier, this increases the threat of contamination through pollen transfer and gene flow from the blooming GM alfalfa fields to non-GM nearby fields or wild populations (even roadside alfalfa plants) within insect flying distance (from three to five miles). It is worth noting that there are currently non-GM alfalfas, such as the Alforex variety 'Hi-Gest', being marketed in the U.S. that have also been bred with low-lignin qualities and, therefore, the 'advantage' is available in non-GM alfalfas as well.

Alberta's thriving organic agricultural industry could be jeopardized by allowing the introduction of GM alfalfa into Alberta. As per the Canadian Organic Products Regulations and Standards, which came into force on June 1, 2009, GM ingredients in organic products is prohibited, regardless of whether or not those GM ingredients are registered (Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada). The Canadian organic food market is positioned for exponential growth. According to the census completed on May 16, 2006 there were 2,629 farms with organic production in Alberta, 5.3% of all farms in the province. The predominant group of organic products grown in Alberta was hay or field crops (60.5% of the province's organic farms), (Statistics Canada). In 2012 organic food sales in Alberta totaled \$416 million which was second only to British Columbia in the organic fruit market and second only to Ontario in prepackaged groceries (Global News, August 2014).

In order to be classified as "organic", all agricultural products used for feeding livestock must be certified organic to the respective program and cannot contain any GM material (Alberta Organic Producers Association). Dairy cows, in particular, are fed large amounts of alfalfa feed; although beef livestock, hogs, poultry, sheep/lamb and goats may also consume feed containing alfalfa. Therefore, any traces of GM alfalfa found in organic hay or feed supplements would critically damage these markets, as well as the organic dairy industry.

Additionally, there is a significant market, both domestic and export, for organic alfalfa seed for hay production which would be destroyed if GM material was detected. *Canada currently has high quality seed and a reputation for clean organic products* (Saskatchewan Organic Directorate). However, the introduction of GM canola into Canada in 1995 has devastated the organic canola industry. The unintended presence of GM canola in organic canola fields was not detectable before harvest, nor could it be prevented due to the prevalence of GM canola on prairie farms (Canadian Biotechnology Action Network, April 2013). "Every organic grain farmer has lost the right to grow organic canola free of GMO contamination risk. Every organic grain farmer has lost the ability to sell organic canola into Europe" (Saskatchewan Organic Directorate, May 2006).

At this time there is a very real threat to Alberta's alfalfa industry if Roundup Ready alfalfa is introduced into the province. Indeed, despite assurances that Roundup Ready alfalfa would enhance weed control options and flexibility, it appears that the emergence and increased presence of herbicide-resistant weeds due to increased use of Roundup has created a need for the use of a wider variety of herbicides on a crop that typically does not require application of herbicides. According to USDA data, 90% of all alfalfa produced by farmers in the U.S. was previously grown without the use of herbicides.

The cost of herbicide is high, foreign export markets are tightening and, in turn, producers stand to lose millions of dollars in sales as markets become more limited due to contamination of genetically modified biotypes. At this time, genetically modified / engineered alfalfa must not be introduced into Alberta.

Grain farmers need to be prepared for August 1 wheat reclassification

The Saskatchewan Wheat Development Commission (Sask Wheat), the Alberta Wheat Commission (AWC) and the Manitoba Wheat and Barley Growers Association (MWBGA) are asking Prairie grain farmers to be prepared for the upcoming reclassification of 29 wheat varieties.

On August 1, 2018, 25 varieties of wheat currently classified as Canada Western Red Spring (CWRS) and four varieties currently classified as Canada Prairie Spring Red (CPSR) will be reclassified into the Canada Northern Hard Red (CNHR) class.

"We want farmers to have a plan to market any remaining wheat that is transitioning to a new class on August 1," says Sask Wheat Chair Laura Reiter. "It is important farmers know what they have in their bins and that they communicate with their local elevator or buyers soon to make sure they are able to maximize the return on these varieties."

In February 2015, the Canadian Grain Commission (CGC) announced the Canadian wheat class modernization process. The process was undertaken to maintain the quality, enhance the consistency and support the marketability of Canadian wheat. In December 2015, the CGC announced the creation of the CNHR and Canada Western Special Purpose wheat classes.

Many producers have been preparing over the last two years by transitioning to varieties not designated for reclassification. However, according to the CGC's 2017 Grain Varieties by Acreage Insured Report, 491,108 acres of wheat varieties which are designated for the CNHR class on August 1, including Harvest, Lillian and Unity, were still grown in Western Canada in 2017.

"The CGC is not allowing any grace period for producers after the July 31st deadline," said Kevin Bender, AWC Chair. "We therefore think it's important that farmers negotiate the best possible terms for the varieties being reclassified and be aware that grain companies will have until December 31, 2018 to ship any remaining stocks from the system as CWRS and CPSR."

Producers who have a contracted delivery date after August 1 for a transitioning variety should contact their elevator or grain buyer as soon as possible to ensure their grain will be accepted as CWRS or CPSR. Wheat varieties classified as CNHR are expected to sell at a discount to the CWRS and CPSR classes.

"The MWBGA is happy to partner with our fellow wheat organizations in communicating to Western Canadian producers the importance of making a transition plan," says Fred Greig, MWBGA Chair. "Maintaining the quality of the CWRS class is important to Canada's reputation and will benefit farmers. While the reclassified varieties are still registered and can be grown, we strongly recommend that farmers arrange their marketing options for these varieties prior to future plantings."

On January 15, 2016, the Canadian Grain Commission announced the implementation of the Canada Northern Hard Red and Canada Western Special Purpose wheat classes.



Alberta timese better together

Alberta Wheat and Barley Commissions say passing of Bill C-49 is a historic turning point for the grain industry, thank Ministers Garneau and MacAulay for commitment to farmers



(Calgary, Alberta) May 23, 2018 – The Alberta Wheat Commission (AWC) and Alberta Barley say today's news that Bill C-49, the Transportation Modernization Act, is about to receive Royal Assent represents a historic step forward for farmers. The Commissions have pressed hard for years to see a reformed transportation system that farmers can rely on to get their product to Canada's global customers in a timely fashion.

The commissions are now looking forward to seeing key aspects of the legislation implemented including shippers' ability to negotiate reciprocal penalties in service level agreements with the railways and access to long haul interswitching to open up better competitive rail options.

The commissions hope to see these mechanisms introduced in the system prior to the beginning of the crop year on August 1 and look forward to seeing the railways' plans for moving the 2018 crop.

"We saw today that the government is listening to farmers," said Jason Lenz, Alberta Barley Chair. "Bill C-49 is a monumental turning point – it not only provides the long-term competitive mechanisms to improve rail service that we've been working to see implemented, but also paves the way for Canada to maintain its status as a reliable supplier to our global customers."

The commissions further note their gratitude to Ministers Marc Garneau and Lawrence MacAulay for their commitment to this file. The Senate Standing Committee on Transport and Communications chaired by Senator David Tkachuk also played an instrumental role in bringing forward important amendments that strengthen the legislation.

"We are extremely pleased to see the government move this long overdue legislation forward," said Kevin Bender, AWC Chair. "Bill C-49 lays the foundation for a transportation system where all players, including the railways, are accountable for their performance."

The commissions look forward to monitoring the implementation of Bill C-49 through the Crop Logistics Working Group of which AWC is a member.

Alberta Agriculture Insect Monitoring Program

This program is coordinated by Scott Meers, Insect Management Specialist with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry and his technician, Shelley Barkley.

There are seven main surveys. Pea leaf weevil, cabbage seedpod weevil, diamondback moth, bertha armyworm, grasshoppers, wheat midge and wheat stem sawfly. In addition we will be doing several smaller surveillance surveys including a survey of the new canola flower midge. This survey will concentrate in central Alberta and up into the Peace River region.

The pea leaf weevil survey, is conducted in late May and June and will be carried out throughout Alberta in 2018. This survey consists of—is done by counting the number of feeding notches on 10 plants in each of 5 locations in the field. We work along the headland and do not enter the field at all. If you have a pea field that we could survey please contact us at the email provided below.

Bertha armyworm (June/July) and diamondback moth (May/June) surveys are pheromone based and are conducted by cooperators. Traps are place on canola field margins and checked weekly. Results are tabulated by cooperators, Trap counts are entered by cooperators using a web based reporting system and automatically reported via our web page. We are always looking to fill holes in our monitoring system. If producers or agrologists wish to participate, we welcome their assistance and will provide all needed supplies.

Cabbage seedpod weevil survey is done at early flower by taking a set of 25 sweeps with a sweep net. The number of cabbage seedpod weevils, lygus and diamondback moth larvae are reported. In addition we have a reporting tool which agrologists can report the cabbage seedpod weevil numbers they are finding.

The grasshopper survey is carried out by agriculture fieldmen (during early August) in their county each year. The results are tabulated by Alberta Agriculture and Forestry. This is the most heavily utilized survey of the seven we help coordinate.

Wheat midge and wheat stem sawfly surveys are carried out after harvest each year. The sawfly survey involves assessing the percentage of sawfly cut stems in 4 locations, 1 meter long, in each field. This survey is done in the traditional wheat stem sawfly area of southern Alberta and eastern central Alberta. Wheat midge is surveyed in all wheat growing areas of Alberta. This survey involves taking soil cores and washing overwintering larvae out of the soil. From this a forecast is prepared on the risk of midge populations the next year. If you have a wheat field that we could survey please contact us at the email provided below.

We never drive in fields, rather parking on the roadside and walk in. We ALWAYS use sterilized boots or boot covers when entering fields and any tools that are used (ie soil sampler etc) are sterilized between fields. Our field entry protocol can be found on our website.

Agriculture Fieldmen receive a year-end report for their county. Any producer that volunteers a field (or fields) will also get a year-end report from our program on what was found.

I am sending this letter as a follow up to the first quarter report of VSI expenditures, for your jurisdiction, that was e-mailed to greg@clearhillscounty.ab.ca and sarah@clearhillscounty.ab.ca.

Following is an estimate of your current VSI account status:

Administrative fees and investment income has not been calculated or included for the first three months of 2018.

Overall there is a 17.8% decrease in total claims for the first quarter of 2018 compared to 2017. Total costs have decreased \$28,587 over the same time period.

Ten (10) of the sixteen (16) VSI jurisdictions had a decrease in their first quarter costs. Decreases ranged from 7.3% to 70.3% of 2017 first quarter costs. Increases in the other six (6) jurisdictions ranged from 3.1% to 32.1% of 2017 first quarter costs.

Your 2018 first quarter claims are \$1,524 (12.7%) higher than they were in 2017. One clinic has not yet submitted their March claims, which may be reflected in the 2nd quarter.
