March 7 & 8, 2023 Olds, Alberta Olds College

Garry Candy

Well organized, fast paced, excellent speakers – new information:

- Amount and type of invasive plants and aquatic animals
- Extent of research into methods to control
- Cost of continuing control

March 7, 2023

Doug McCaulley – MC for the day

Dr. David Ensing - Ag & Agri-Food Canada

- Focus on spotted knapweed in BC (research in Summerland, BC, Okanagan Nation)
- Weed reduces forage quality- increases water runoff which starves acres under plants of moisture
- Has a pink or yellow bushy flower, reproduces by seed only
- Control measures
 - o root feeding
 - o biological methods of releasing root feeding weevils
 - o as weevils increase, plant population decreases
 - o 50% of plants have a weevil in them when checked
- Attendee question Is knapweed decreasing?
 - Answer Yes, plants show bio-control agent effects
 - 60% by root feeding or top feeding; they won't attack heads without fertilization in progress (seed building)
 - Plant population requires seed rain to have about 1500 seeds/meter to maintain plant growth
- Attendee question there have been mixed results in areas of control. Can bio explain this?

- Answer By Weevil hardiness and growing season length
- Centaurea Stoebe or Spotted Knapweed are two types in BC. Centaurea Stoebe is under control, Spotted Knapweed is not
- Centra Diffusa type of knapweed, is a biannual also called tumble weed, the Spotted can have a life span up to 15 years
- Take away from the speaker -
 - Population is declining because of bio control
 - o Site variation potentials with mismatches between weevils
 - Grazing can cause poor study results bio control is more effective in nongrazed areas

Mathew Wells

- Leafy Spurge
 - Working with Blood Tribe near Lethbridge leafy spurge is choking out the sweetgrass and sage used by the indigenous people
 - Leafy Spurge has long greenish flowers, spreads by root movement as well as seed spread so requires different attack methods
 - Requires different attack methods:
 - Competitive plant stands
 - Livestock grazing
 - Chemical
 - Leafy spurge beetles collect and distribute
 - Using goats eat only spurge; help by distributing beetles on their hair, seeds do not get spread in manure as they grind them up

Mark Deluge - Teton County, Wyoming. EDRR Program - Early Detection, Rapid Response

- Questioned as to whether we, as weed managers, are doing enough? Doing anything?
- Teton County case study: 10% of the state is privately owned tourism brings in 5
 million visitors per year with campers, ATV's, etc. all with the possibility of seeds on
 them
- Study included identifying problems by
 - Data gathering

- Mapping weed species
- o Risks posed
- o Clean areas to protect?
- Degrees of planning rare infestation, localized infestation, regional, widespread
- Toad Flax and Spotted Knapweed like to be together hence the need for EDER
- 5 years free of the weed considered eradicated (maybe)
- \$200 offered for finding Salt Cedar
- Drones used in areas to find plants
- Hoary Cress fairly tall $2 2 \frac{1}{2}$ feet. Grey green leaves, white flowers causes reduced growth on grazing land and is a contaminant for seed.

Natasha Rines - Edmonton

- Weed control on vacant crown land needing to be a partnership between government and public
- To control terrestrial invasive species, government needs partnerships with MD's, Counties to locate and control
- Need NGO's (non-government organizers) use money and resources more efficiently than government – AISC is a partner

Megan Evans

- Spoke on what AISC is actively involved in
 - Expanding bio control of oxeye daisy/tansy
 - Weed free forage
 - Wild pig awareness some controls in place such as bounties
 - Billboards for awareness of invasive species
 - o 293 attendees this year at the conference
 - invasive species control in Alberta costs 2.1 billion dollars in losses and control measures
 - \$100,000 secured for tansy
 - Short and long term grants of \$465,000 waiting on approvals

Andrea Sawatzky - Pesticide compliance officer – Health Canada. Based out of Calgary for 20 years

- All pesticides must meet the Pest Control Products Act. PCPA.
- Products are re-evaluated every 5 years
- 15 years for market use and labels
- If a product is cancelled, applicators have 3 years to use up inventory; 2 years to use up inventory with old labelling
- Check Access Health Canada site to check products to find proposed and final decisions. PRD – Proposed Registration Decision
- Decision coming on Pynifluguinazon for control of aphids and white flies in greenhouse vegetables

Vivian Servent – Pesticide Specialist with Alberta Government (retired)

- Charts available for all chemicals
- Undergo environmental monitoring
- Regulate application of pesticides near water sources can move through air movement, evaporation, run off and leaching
- Alberta Environment and Parks monitors pesticides, chemicals in treated water, river water and surface water
- Guidelines in place for drinking water, river water, aquatic life water and ponds
- From 2017-2022 over 25 sites of river monitoring 5 times a year
- 2-4D is most prevalent due to widespread use in agriculture, residential and commercial properties
- Monitoring of upstream and downstream of urban sites downstream shows more 2-4D and other than upstream
- All water samples done over 25 years show less contamination from chemicals than guidelines allow

Dr. Victoria Maloney – ENVU, formerly Bayer – Calgary

- Control of invasive annual grasses can be done with Indaziflam
- Invasive annual grasses

- o Germinate spring and fall
- Deplete food supply for other plants
- o Prolific growers producing ton load of seeds
- USA watching plant called Medusa Head very prolific, takes nutrients, provides no forage value
- Downy Brome everywhere in Canada except Newfoundland particularly thick in southern Alberta
- 74% of acres burned in wild fires are rangelands grasses come back quickly after fire.
- Management includes grazing, spraying, mowing but have no effect on seed nee to be proactive, not reactive
 - o Idazeflam called Explanade in Canada can be used om the grasses does not affect perennials.
 - Needs water on the ground to work can result in increased production of perennials up to 200%.

Nicole Kimmel - Alberta Government - Aquatic species update

- Events planned to promote awareness Edmonton Boat Show in March and Pond Days
- Fished out 87,000 gold fish from a Lethbridge pond built up over 2 year period in July
- Used pop up watercraft station Aug 22
- Found a Coal Lake Carp in the mouth of a pike in June/22.
- Blood Indian Reserve netted over 350,000 carp the first year and about a third of that the next and then about 20,000 year later
- Whitemud Creek samples for rosy red minnows none
- Phraymite sampling done Aug/22 in 3 new locations including city of Lacombe plants are growing around their reservoir
- Watercraft inspection stations set up in high risk entries like BC
- 19 mussel fouled boats were found. Infestation of mussels in AB could cost up to 75 million
- 121 plants found on boats and 1021 skippers

- Caroway, south of Cardston and Coutts, southeast of Lethbridge have watercraft inspection stations. Both are entries to Montana
- Pale yellow Iris found in Lacombe Lake dug up 300 lbs of plants. Believe purposely planted.
- North Saskatchewan River has Prussian Carp and also in the Cardoff trout pond.
 People moving them in.
- Trying to control purple loose strife from Wabamum Lake one plant can produce 2.5 million seeds
- Crayfish found in Banff- moved from Calgary City Limits to Banff by people
- Herbicide studies on Lake Isle using boat and air application on complete shoreline

Dr. Stephanie Green – U of A – in charge of Coastal and Freshwater Ecological areas

- Removal and relocating of 5000 different invasive species
- 243 managers from North America are involved
- Focusing on Northern Crayfish, Prussian Carp for eradication
- Rust crayfish are showing up because they are used as bait. They disrupt spawning areas when carp-compete for food and space and carry disease.
- Use angler surveys and follow up

Brad Peters – AB Lake Management

- Searching for invasive species in AB lakes with AB Lake Society, Private Lake Watch, lakekeepers and recreational water monitoring
- Lake watch involves 30 lakes monitored twice a year finding Zebra Mussels, guegga mussels and spiny water flea.
- Docks are moved in and out of lakes such as Pigeon Lake for seasons and the owners are asked to check for mussels.

Dr. Hennington – U of A

Using DNA to find invasive species

Tested 252 samples from 69 lakes using DNA backpacks

Sara Stahlman - Penn State Sea Grant

- From-Erie, Pennsylvania works-to-protect-and-maintain-coastal-waters-and-watersheds
- Posters UNWANTED DEAD OR ALIVE
- Teamed up with a brewery to promote awareness and precautions
- Mystery Snail Ale has its own label and with a purchase they receive gift cards for coasters, stickers to start conversations
- Had a big day of Snail Races one entry was called Snailvester Stalone
- Then a round goldeye launch
- 90% of those targeted through beer events knew nothing about invasive species and the dangers

Shrub and Forbs Regrowth Balance Demand with Supply Katherine Hogan

Graze in the proper season

- -Control timing
- -Avoid vulnerable times
- -Align grazing with forage production

Provide rest for your plants

- -They need rest during growing season
- -Weedy plants thrive when desirable plants are weakened

Control livestock

-Make them eat what you give them

Forested Rangeland Health-

- -Integrity
- -Community Structure
- -Water and Nutrient Cycling
- -Site Stability
- -Weeds

4 Principles of Range Management

- Balance demand with supply
- Graze in proper season, not in first growth
- Provide effective rest, 30-60 days
- Control livestock distribution, but still need loafing areas

What's in it for me?

- -Lower maintenance
- -Improved during drought
- -Reduced noxious weeds

Appling Grazing Principles In The Riparian Area Norine Ambrose: Cows And Fish

Riparian Functions

- -Trap and store sediment
- -Build and maintain banks and shorelines
- -Store water and energy

- -Recharge aquifers
- -Filter and buffer water
- -Maintain biodiversity
- -Store carbon and reduce its loss

Grazing Management Principles

- -Balance animal demand with the available forage supply
- -Provide effective 'rest' after grazing
- -Avoid or minimize grazing range when fragile or vulnerable periods
- -Distribute livestock evenly

Key Principles on Management Change

Make sure they are practical, economical, restorative and sustainable Fence off riparian areas to use pasture properly

When you see heavy use of shrubs it time to move livestock even if there is grass Use salt to move livestock where you want them to be; they will always go to salt 80% of cattle drink out of tanks, which in turn gives you a 5-23% weight gain

Tame Pastures in the System Johanna Murray PCBFA

Tame pasture rule of thumb-

50-75% utilization of tame pastures is acceptable

30-60 days of rest is the norm (dependant on grazing systems, forage species and of course weather conditions)

May be grazed earlier or later than native pastures

Growth rate can be quicker also depending on your forage type

Grazing Systems-

Continuous: can cause weed problems, overstocking, and lower pasture quality overall

May be useful in instances where there is lots of pasture and limited livestock

Rotational: varies by intensiveness, can be high maintenance but generally is a higher quality pasture

Flexibility in the system is important

Regardless of your system you must be able to adjust plans based on weather, animal performance and forage production

Pastures need-

Healthy soils: - Fertility

Lack of compaction

- Organic Matter

Healthy Plants: - Right species for your area

- Good grazing practices
- Weather

Upland Forest Reclamation Program Overview

- Focused on reclamation and reforestation of disturbed upland forest ecosystems
- Mostly field level, operational experiments
- Some greenhouse trials
- Disturbances: Mines, Pipelines, Roads and Forestry to name a few

Peatland Restoration Program Overview

Peatland restoration techniques

- Moss layer transfer
- Hummock transplants
- Site preparation
- Water connectivity

Greenhouse gas emissions

- Disturbed sites, natural areas, restored sites

Unproductive Pasture

Possible reasons for Low Productivity

- -Too wet; cleared wetlands, draws
- -Too dry; coarse textured soils, exposed windy areas, low organic matter
- -Poor nutrition
- -Soil structure; ruts, compaction, heavy clay
- -Natural salinity
- -Site dominated by unpalatable weed species

Benefits of Bush Pasture

- -Unproductive pasture is likely capable of growing healthy native species
- -Native species are resilient, growing in diverse communities. Not everything will grow, but something always will
- -Evolved to grow in this environment; dry summers, extreme temps, forest soils
- -Tolerant of disturbances; fires, insect damage, ungulate grazing
- -Many perennial species, once established will remain on the landscape long term if managed properly
- -Improved soil health

Species Selection Consideration

Site Conditions- moisture, soil type, nutrition Goals- palatable forage, improving soil health, increasing organic matter Surrounding natural areas Appropriate canopy structure for cattle grazing

Species to Avoid

- -Conifer trees [creates too thick of canopy for any undergrowth]
- -Toxic plants [tall larkspur, monks hood, water hemlock to name a few]
- -Unpalatable trees and shrubs [black poplar, oak, buffalo berry, hazelnut, etc.]

You can seed grasses and forbs by yourself Transplant trees from your own land or crown land with a permit Labour intensive, but possible to find and plant trees like poplar, willow and dogwood

Cows and Trees

Geoff Alkinson, RPF Area Forester Forestry, Parks and Tourism Grande Prairie Forest Area

In 2003 Beef and Timber industries approached the Govt. of Alberta addressing concerns and interest regarding putting cows and trees on the land together

Discussion resulted in a Policy made in 2006, where the Grazing and Timber Integration Manual was made (updated in 2011)

In 2022 Forestry developed guidelines for clearing fencelines and fields on grazing leases.

Regenerating Deciduous Trees

- -When aspen and poplars are cut they sucker easily
- -Aspen and Poplar are most palatable to livestock in June of the first year following cutting
- -Good practice would be to keep livestock out of tree stands until summer
- -Another good practice is to just light graze the first couple summers

Regenerating Coniferous Trees

- -When coniferous trees are cut they do not sucker so they have to be replanted
- -Regenerating coniferous cut blocks can produce more forage than original stands
- -It's a good idea to keep livestock out for two years

Grazing Timber Agreements

Grazing Timber Agreements (GTA) is a written agreement created between grazing and timber deposition holders, outlines the two parties will operate on common land base

GTA's are required when either party is planning to do something that could impact the interest of the deposition holder

Ex: grazing regenerated cutblocks or timber harvest Rangeland Agrologists and Area Forester review GTA's

Rangeland Improvements

If you want to do anything with range improvements you must have an open discussion with a Rangeland Agrologist, then after that's reviewed it will go to Forestry and Fish and Wildlife. Between the three they will make a final decision.

It's your grass in any grazing lease but <u>all</u> timber belongs to the Crown. So this includes:

- -Road allowance timber
- -Fence line timber
- -Field timber
- -Re-clearing growth on fence lines
- -Dead tree management

Beaver Management Understanding and Living with Beavers

Typical family-2 adults 2 young of the year 2 2yr olds

Yes, they do cause a lot of damage to land Beavers like to live in

- -Adequate water supply
- Aspen and willow trees close
- -One beaver cuts .6-1 aspen per day
- -A colony cuts 1 acre in 1-2.5 years
- -Beavers hate the sound of running water, but the dam is built to leak water to keep water flowing

Beaver ponds store 382 dump trucks of sediment!

Downstream from each pond

- -50-75% less suspended solids
- -20-60% less phosphorus
- -20-25% less nitrogen
- Up to 23% less carbon sequestered
- -Less fecal coliforms

Build trapezoidal shaped fences around culverts to deter beavers from plugging off Down South they did 12 locations and saved \$180,000 in repairs with land and road repairs

1. Definitions:

1.1. Pest - pest or nuisance as defined in the Agricultural Pest Act, Pest and Nuisance Control Regulations

2. Purpose:

- 2.1. To manage currently established pest populations and reduce widespread infestations and damage.
- 2.2. To prevent establishment of pests that are not currently established within the county.

3. Policy Statement

3.1. Clear Hills County recognizes the need to assist agricultural producers with managing pest populations and preventing introduction of foreign pests that negatively affect livestock production and/or crop production.

4. Responsibilities

4.1. Education

- 4.1.1. Agricultural Services will make available educational materials and information for agricultural producers regarding animal husbandry, livestock pest and disease management and crop pest and disease management.
- 4.1.2. Agricultural Services will make available resources and tools for managing pest populations and for preventing establishment and spread of introduced pests.
- 4.1.3. Agricultural Services will provide awareness and education to the general public regarding identification of agricultural pests, expected response of public, and potential impact of pest outbreaks.

4.2. Monitoring

4.2.1. Inspectors, or designates, may conduct surveys as requested by Alberta Agriculture.

- 4.2.2. Administration may inform the public of the general results of any surveys conducted by county inspectors or designates.
- 4.2.3. Inspectors may conduct other surveys as determined by the Agricultural Service Board.
- 4.2.4. Clear Hills County may contract pest surveys to third party agencies.

4.3. Inspectors

- 4.3.1. Inspectors will be trained in pest identification, management techniques, and control measures.
- 4.3.2. Appointed inspectors will hold valid Form 7s for the use of Compound 1080 tablets and/or Sodium Cyanide M-44 Control Devices.
- 4.3.3. Inspectors will investigate all pest related complaints.
- 4.3.4. Inspectors will not issue control material or devices if such measures will endanger public safety, domestic animals or wildlife (as defined in the Wildlife Act).
- 4.3.5. Inspectors may issue Compound 1080 tablets or set Sodium Cyanide M-44 devices for coyote control to stop coyote harassment of domestic livestock.

4.4. Public Property

- 4.4.1. Clear Hills County will control nuisances on public land only if the Agricultural Fieldman determines that;
 - 4.4.1.1. the population of the nuisance organism or disease meets or exceeds economic thresholds and.
 - 4.4.1.2. the nuisance organism is a threat to agricultural production of adjacent agricultural producers and,
 - 4.4.1.3. affected producers will also control those nuisances on their adjacent land in the affected area.

1 Policy Statement

 Clear Hills County strives to maintain roadsides that have a high level of visibility, support adequate drainage, prevent weeds from spreading and are aesthetically acceptable.

2. Definitions

 Roadside - that portion of the road allowance that extends from the edge of the driving surface to the adjacent property line.

3. Purpose

• To provide direction to administration for the control of roadside vegetation in an environmentally safe, publicly acceptable and cost effective manner.

4. Responsibilities

a. Brushing

Public Works Manager will:

- i. Provide council with an annual project plan to remove all brush from County roadsides.
- ii. Contract and/or operate equipment for clearing and mulching of trees and brush;
- iii. Provide follow up inspections to insure roads and roadsides are clear of brushing debris, stumps and mounds;
- iv. Obtain any necessary warranty work from contractors following the
- v. inspection of the completed job;
- vi. Seed suitable pasture seed mix, as required, to prevent erosion and weed

- vii. competition;
- viii. Notify in writing landowners with property adjacent to the roadsides
- ix. included in the annual brushing program plan prior to work commencing.

The County will:

- x. provide a Brushing Request agreement (Form B) to landowners, whereby:
- xi. The landowner agrees to allow the municipality to enter their land to brush outwards into the road ditches.
- xii. When landowners are requesting private land brushing or have brushed approximately 5 meters beyond the right of way and the brushing extends onto private land adjacent to road ditches, the vegetation will be controlled by spraying or mowing to control regrowth of brush and included as part of the agreement.
- xiii. The County will be responsible for all surveying costs and staking of the work area which extends approximately 5 meters beyond the right of way.

b. Do Not Brush Backslope program

- i. The Do Not Brush Backslope program is available for persons who want to retain the trees and brush on the backslope of the road allowance in front of their residence.
- ii. Landowners must request in writing for the County Brushing Program to leave the trees and brush on the backslope of the road allowance in front of their residence.

c. Spraying

- i. The program will focus on brush control to prevent regrowth and vegetation as listed in the Weed Control Act of Alberta and/or plants designated by County by-law and are the same as the Agricultural Service Board expects the public to control.
- ii. Spraying will not occur adjacent to yard sites or known herbicide sensitive vegetation such as gardens or shelterbelts or within the legislated setback from water bodies and water sources.

- iii. Agricultural Fieldman will:
- iv. Contract for and/or apply herbicide to kill brush regrowth in the year following the brushing program.
- v. Contractor for and/or apply herbicide to Noxious & Prohibited Noxious weeds to prevent weed spread & weed seed propagation;
- vi. Select herbicide based on the following criteria:
 - 1. Registered for use in Alberta
 - 2. Registered for control of the target vegetation
 - 3. Cost effectiveness
 - 4. Suitability for site, application conditions and will not increase environmental foot print.

d. Do Not Spray Program:

- i. The Do Not Spray program is available for persons who do not want the roadside adjacent to their property sprayed.
- Landowners must complete and sign a Roadside Spraying form (Form A) stating that they do not wish to have the road allowance adjacent to specific land locations sprayed,
- iii. Landowners accept full responsibility for weed and brush control within the stated road allowance.
- iv. Failure to control the weeds and brush in the current growing season will result in the County controlling the weeds and brush in accordance with this policy.

e. Mowing

- i. Mowing operations will rotate throughout the County on an annual basis, as per the project plan approved by council, to ensure all roads are maintained as efficiently as possible.
- ii. Agricultural Fieldman will:
- iii. Provide council with an annual project plan to mow County owned roadside ditches.
- iv. Contract and/or operate equipment to mow County owned roadside ditches.

Mowing of roads will be prioritized as follows:

v. Market Roads: first priority; annually mow to outside edge of road right-of-way (fence line to fence line).

- vi. Local roads: second priority; annually mow to outside edge of mowable road right-of-way (property line to property line).
- vii. All other roads: last priority: annually mow to outside edge of mowable road right-of-way (property line to property line) as needed for brush between 4 and 6 feet in height adjacent to road.

f. Mowing for Community Organizations

- Clear Hills County offers to mow outfields and large grassed-in areas that are beyond the reasonable scope of riding and push lawn mowers for community not-for-profit organizations within the County, once annually in conjunction with the roadside mowing program.
- ii. Organizations requesting this service are required to sign a waiver annually protecting Clear Hills County, see attachment Form C.
- iii. Mowing of outfields and large grassed in areas that are beyond the reasonable scope of riding and push lawn mowers shall be completed subject to the conditions set out in Form C. In the event that the Agricultural Fieldman or his representative determines that the area requested is too hazardous difficult to mow the Organization will be notified that the area cannot be mowed.

g. Alternative Weed Control Methods

i. In Environmentally sensitive areas due to soil structure, native species sénsitivity or where legislated setback from water bodies and water sources prevent the application of herbicides, mowing or brushing, Agricultural Services staff will implement alternative weed control methods such as hand picking or use of biological controls. 1. Policy Statement

1.1. Clear Hills County will implement procedures to reduce the possibility of introduction, limit the spread, and minimize yield losses of Clubroot in Canola in the County.

2. Responsibilities

- 2.1. Agricultural Services staff will conduct a minimum of 25 field inspections, as per Clubroot in Canola Procedure 6306-01, for Clubroot on Canola grown in the County. Fields will be selected according to the following criteria:
 - 2.1.1. Fields surrounding an infected field; or fields associated with an infected field through equipment, geography, ownership, etc.
 - 2.1.2. Canola fields displaying symptoms similar to those infected with Clubroot
 - 2.1.3. Fields with a short or no crop rotation. (ie. canola on canola)
 - 2.1.4. Random fields throughout the County for adequate surveying coverage.
- 2.2. Agricultural Services staff will educate producers, general public and other industry about Clubroot of Canola, through newsletters, publications, workshops and one-on-one communications.
- 2.3. Any Canola crops displaying symptoms of Clubroot infection will be sampled and samples will be sent to a credible laboratory for confirming or denying the presence of Clubroot.
- 2.4. Agricultural Service Board will work cooperatively with neighboring municipalities and primary producers.

3. Enforcement

- 3.1. Upon confirmation of a Clubroot infected Canola field in the County:
 - 3.1.1. The landowner and registered occupant will be notified in writing with a legal notice in accordance with the Alberta Agricultural Pests Act.
 - 3.1.2. All landowners and registered occupants within a 5 mile radius of the field where Clubroot was confirmed, will be sent written notice that Clubroot was confirmed within 5 miles of their property. Additional information including the *Alberta Clubroot Management Plan,* Clubroot of Canola Policy 6306, Clubroot identification information, equipment cleaning procedures and information on minimizing the spread of Clubroot.
 - 3.1.3. A County wide public notice will be issued, informing the general public, contractors, stakeholders, industry and all County landowners that Clubroot of Canola has been confirmed in the County. This will be posted in the County newsletter and the local newspaper.
- 3.2. A Notice given for Clubroot will require for the infected field:
 - 3.2.1. That no canola crop or any host crop shall be grown in that field for a minimum of 3 years, beginning with the year following the discovery of Clubroot infection

in that field. In the 4th year a Clubroot resistant canola variety may be grown.

- 3.2.2. That all volunteer host plants (cultivars or weeds) must be destroyed to prevent more than 3 weeks growth.
- 3.2.3. That straw, chaff, feed, dirt, and debris must not be removed from the field for 4 years following the year of detecting Clubroot in the field.
- 3.2.4. That access areas to the infected field be seeded and maintained with non-susceptible grasses (for cleaning equipment).
- 3.2.5. That all equipment leaving that field must be cleaned by removing all dirt, plant material, and debris.
- 3.3. Infected fields will be monitored for compliance for 4 years following the issuance of the Notice.
- 3.4. Crops growing in non-compliance will be destroyed at the landowner's expense.
- 3.5. Should enforcement be required, additional administrative fees will be charged at 15% of the cost of enforcement.

1. Policy Statement

In an effort to support wolf population control within Clear Hills County, the County will implement procedures to provide for a wolf management incentive program for the purpose of promoting wolf management in the municipality. Through this program Participants will receive a monetary reward for the carcass of a wolf harvested lawfully within the Municipality, assisting in the protection of residents' livestock and the protection of the Boreal Caribou species.

2. Definitions:

- 2.1. Immediate Family means the participant's spouse or adult interdependent partner, the participant's children, the parents of the participant and the parents of the participant's spouse or adult interdependent partner;
- 2.2. Household immediate family members that reside in the same dwelling with the Participant.

3. General

- 3.1. Council may annually during budget deliberations, establish a budget for the Wolf Management Incentive program.
- 3.2. By resolution of Council the Wolf Hunt Management Incentive program will be activated and deactivated.
- 3.3 By resolution of Council the payment amount will be established for each eligible wolf (adult and non-adult) taken within the boundaries of Clear Hills in accordance with the listed conditions.

4. Private property and Grazing Leases

- 4.1 A maximum of two wolf carcasses per month per household may be verified for payment to a qualified Participant, with a maximum of seven wolf carcasses per calendar year for wolves harvested on private property and grazing leases within the boundaries of Clear Hills County.
- 4.2 Eligible Participants will:

- 4.2.1 Be a resident of Clear Hills County on land owned by the resident, or their immediate family and reside in a dwelling on that property for no less than 183 days (six months)
- 4.2.2 Provide a list of immediate family that reside in the same dwelling "household" that may participate in this wolf management incentive program.
- 4.2.3 Provide business name, if different than participant's name that land or grazing leases may be registered under.
- 4.2.4 Provide a list of private property owned and grazing leases held in the participant's name or business name within the boundaries of Clear Hills County.
- 4.2.5 Eligible Participants requesting incentive payment shall be registered in advance with Clear Hills County and have entered into a hold-blameless agreement, attached as Appendix A.
- 4.2.6 For verification and authorization of payment the carcass, with pelt intact, from each eligible wolf harvested must be presented at the County office to a designated representative of the County.
- 4.2.7 When presenting the carcass Participants must produce the land location where the wolf was harvested.
- 4.2.8 Wolf carcasses will not be accepted from third parties.
- 4.2.9 Any carcass received by a designated representative of the County will be marked.
- 4.2.10 The Participant will handle the carcass so the designated County representative can confirm there are no markings similar to what other jurisdictions or the County use to identify carcasses presented for payment under a wolf management incentive program.
- 4.2.11 The Participant will make the identification mark on the carcass as directed.
- 4.2.12 Any carcass that has been previously marked will be rejected.
- 4.2.13 Participants will be responsible for disposal of all parts of the wolf carcasses using recognized carcass disposal methods. Note: The County recommends disposal to a trapper to reduce waste of fur or other salvageable parts.
- 4.2.14 Participants participating in the Wolf Hunt Incentive program shall follow all Federal and Provincial Regulations and Legislation, including but not limited to the Wildlife Act, Alberta Hunting Regulations, Firearms Act, Petty Trespass Act.

4.2.15 Participants shall be removed from the list of qualified registrants if found to have not adhered to the policy as set by the Council, and shall not be eligible to receive benefit from this program; this includes, but is not limited to bringing in carcasses that were previously marked or attempting to receive payment for wolves taken either from locations within the county not included in this policy or from outside the County.

5. Registered Trapline Trappers

5.1 A maximum of fifteen wolf carcasses per calendar year, be verified for payment for wolves harvested on a qualifying registered trap line within the boundaries of Clear Hills County. Further, while eligible registered trappers may participate in the Private Property and Grazing Lease portion of this policy, the maximum of fifteen wolf carcasses per calendar year remains at fifteen.

Eligible Participants will:

- 5.2.1 Be a resident of Clear Hills County on land owned by the resident, or their immediate family and reside in a dwelling on that property for no less than 183 days (six months)
- 5.2.2 Provide their trapline number and a map of their registered trapline within Clear Hills County.
- 5.2.3 Provide the names of any trap line partners that may participate in this wolf hunt incentive program.
- 5.2.4 Eligible trappers requesting incentive payment shall be registered in advance with Clear Hills County and have entered into a hold-blameless agreement, attached as Appendix B.
- 5.2.5 For verification and authorization of payment the carcass, with pelt intact, from each eligible wolf harvested must be presented at the County office to a designated representative of the County.
- 5.2.6 When presenting the carcass Participants must produce the approximate land location where the wolf was harvested on the trapline.
- 5.2.7 Wolf carcasses will not be accepted from third parties.
- 5.2.8 Any carcass received by a designated representative of the County will be marked.
- 5.2.9 The Participant will handle the carcass so the designated County representative can confirm there are no markings similar to what other jurisdictions or the County use to identify carcasses presented for payment under a hunting incentive program.
- 5.2.10 The Participant will make the identification mark on the carcass as directed.

1.1. Clear Hills County recognizes the need to have better management of weeds and brush in road right-of-way ditches that cannot be effectively controlled from the roadway, that are adjacent to private land and whereby vegetation control methods may cause crop or tree damage on private land.

2. Purpose:

2.1. To provide complete control of Prohibited Noxious and Noxious weeds and brush along right-of-ways adjacent to private land.

3. Responsibilities

- 3.1. Agricultural Services will provide a *Property Line Spray Request* agreement (form A) to landowners, whereby:
 - 3.1.1. The landowner agrees to:
 - 3.1.1.1. allow the municipality to spray herbicide onto their land that is adjacent to a road ditch;
 - 3.1.1.2. allow the municipality to enter their land to spray herbicides outwards into the road ditches, if necessary;
 - 3.1.1.3. allow the municipality to spray brush up to 1.5 meters in height when adjacent to a road ditch.
- 3.2. Spray crew will extend spray width by approximately 2 meters onto private land adjacent to road ditches, as needed.
- 3.3. Spray crew will utilize the spray truck and/or ATV at the appropriate time of the season, either from the roadside, in the ditch or from the field for effective weed control and minimal crop damage.
- 3.4. Agricultural Services will make available information for land managers regarding the property line spray program.
- 3.5. Inspectors/employees will be trained in property line spraying and safety precautions.

Clear Hills County recognizes the value of Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) testing.

Canada may be at the risk of losing its status as a controlled BSE risk country due to tested numbers not meeting the 30,000 animal annual requirements.

In September of 2011 the province discontinued the \$150.00 per animal incentive given to producers for sampling their animals and maintaining control of the carcass pending BSE test results.

By providing a municipal BSE testing incentive, it will encourage producers to participate in the BSE testing program and assist in realizing the target of keeping the Country's status as a controlled BSE risk country.

2. Purpose:

2.1. To establish guidelines for Clear Hills County's BSE Testing Incentive Program.

3. General:

- 3.1. Council may annually during budget deliberations, establish a budget for the BSE Testing Incentive Program.
- 3.2. By resolution of Council the BSE Testing Incentive Program will be activated and deactivated.
- 3.3. Council will establish the amount of compensation per animal to be paid as an incentive payment for eligible beef cattle that have been BSE tested.

4. Responsibilities

- 4.1. Only beef cattle are eligible for BSE testing and incentive payments.
- 4.2. The Agricultural Service Board will be provided with an annual report on the number of users of the BSE testing incentive program and recommend to Council amendments to the BSE testing incentive program as necessary.
- 4.3. Eligible participants must be Veterinary Services (1980) Ltd. (VSI) members and a resident in Clear Hills County for three consecutive months or a landowner in Clear Hills County with livestock.
- 4.4. V.S.I. Services will provide a list of Clear Hills County VSI members that had animals tested for BSE in the quarterly reports.
- 4.5. Clear Hills County will pay VSI members that have been identified as having animals tested for BSE.
- 4.6. Only Veterinary Clinics will have access to the results of the BSE tests.



Re: Crop Insurance premium increase

The recently released 2023 provincial budget has shown a 60% increase in crop insurance premiums from the 2022 provincial budget and an average of 22% increase over 2022 actual crop insurance premiums. The Brazeau County Agricultural Service Board (ASB), would like to express their concern of this proposed increase, as this additional cost will have a negative financial impact on small to mid-sized operations within our County and the Province.

Local producers and producers across this province are facing unprecedented challenges. Increasing input costs, increasing operational expenses, changing and challenging weather conditions and extreme weather events, disease outbreaks etc. Because of these challenges, farmers are experiencing higher rates of stress, anxiety and depression. With the challenging growing seasons in our province in recent years, and with unpredictable and ever changing weather patterns, producers can feel a sense of security with the risk mitigation that crop insurance provides. Every farmer should be able to afford crop insurance and the peace of mind it offers should disaster strike.

For these reasons, we ask that the government reconsiders this increase in crop insurance premiums and asks that premiums remain at the 2022 levels for the upcoming 2023 growing season. Producers deserve the support of this government, a reprieve from increasing expenses and the peace of mind that crop insurance offers in an industry full of uncertainty.

Our ASB wishes to support these producers in Brazeau County, and we respectfully, and strongly encourage you to join us in advocating for the needs of our rural community.

RE: Letter of support concerning PMRA's change to insecticide lambda-cyhalothrin

Dear Minister Horner, Minister Bibeau and Minister Duclos,

Cypress County's Agricultural Service Board (ASB) is in support of Minister Nate Horner's letter to Ministers Marie-Claude Bibeau and Jean-Yves Duclos regarding the Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA) decision to change the use of the insecticide lambda-cyhalothrin that was effective April 1, 2023.

This has been a very effective insecticide for grasshopper and flea beetle control in crops for farmers and ranchers in Cypress County and we are extremely concerned about the PMRA's decision to change the use of lambda-cyhalothrin.

Since the insecticide can no longer be applied to any crop that may be used for livestock feed, the manufacturer/distributer of Matador has pulled their products containing the active ingredient lambdacyhalothrin from Western Canada.

Southern Alberta has experienced two extremely dry years and 2023 is expected to be a bad year for grasshoppers in Cypress County making this terrible timing for controlling these destructive insects.

In the interest of Cypress County and Alberta producers, we urge you to intervene and encourage the PMRA to reconsider their decision to implement changes for use of lambda-cyhalothrin on product labels, effective April 1, 2023, until another effective alternative product is in place and to reverse their decision regarding this important product.

The 2023 season is quickly approaching, and producers would greatly appreciate quick action of this matter.
